Law Enforcement Phlebotomy Program (LEPP) training is an important part of the impaired driving program. While waiting for an individual to respond to draw blood, vital evidence is slipping away. The LEPP is one way to gather evidence in a timely fashion that may otherwise be lost. Becoming a phlebotomist is a strenuous, time-consuming process and should not be entered into lightly.

Officer Qualification for Acceptance into Law Enforcement Phlebotomy Program

1. Meet the following requirements:
 - a. Be a commissioned officer who is off probation with his/her agency.
 - b. Have a minimum of two years of experience after basic training. Reserve time can count but must be approved by the LEPP State Coordinator.
 - c. Not under investigation or have pending disciplinary action.
 - d. Have departmental support of the officer and LEPP. (The department head's signature on the LEPP application meets this requirement.)
2. Individuals who do not meet one or more of the above requirements may be admitted into LEPP training on a case-by-case basis by submitting an application to the State Coordinator with a letter of recommendation and an explanation of how his/her acceptance would benefit LEPP.

Process for Applying

1. Complete and submit this application along with items 2 and 3 below.
2. Provide current curriculum vitae documenting all impaired driver training and other training pertaining to the LEPP. This can include EMT, RN, Paramedic or other healthcare professions.
3. Provide results from a criminal background check or department letter stating they ran an NCIC that showed no results.

Forensic Phlebotomy Program

Those accepted into the ILEPP must successfully complete the forensic phlebotomy program provided by Richland Community College (RCC) in Decatur, IL. This is a fast-track hybrid program that includes two courses. One consists of four weeks of online instruction and a three-day on-campus lab. The second course, which immediately follows the first, includes seven days of clinical experiences in healthcare facilities in Decatur. Officers who successfully complete both courses earn a certificate in Forensic Phlebotomy.

The following health and safety requirements must be met prior to the beginning of the first course:

1. Background check
2. American Heart Association Basic Life Support CPR (formerly BLS for Healthcare Provide)
3. 10-panel drug screen
4. Immunizations (a complete list is found at <https://www.mcletc.org/> on upcoming training tab)
